

## Message from the Prez

It is hard to believe that that 2024 Maine paddle racing season is less than a week away. Race directors have been hard at work preparing for the early spring white water races. With the warm wet winter, paddlers have had a good opportunity to get on the water and do some early training runs in before the St. George kicks off the paddle racing season on Saturday March 30<sup>th</sup>. Maine had another great paddle racing season in 2023. Various Maine paddlers also participated and well represented Maine in several large nationwide destination paddle racing events. More details about the 2023 paddle racing season are included in several articles in this newsletter. In 2023, we saw some new races appear on the schedule, including a series of 3-5 mile races in Portland on Monday evenings on Casco Bay. These races are sponsored by Portland Paddle, an outfitter based out of Portland. The races go out of East End Beach and present an opportunity for MaCKRO's membership base to spread to the more populated region of southern Maine. The Millinocket-X Stream race seems to be gaining popularity as a solid challenging whitewater race.

Maine paddle races in 2024 will basically include all of the races offered in 2023. The Aroostook River Fun Run in May is back for 2024. The Northern Forest Canoe Trail will be sponsoring a flatwater paddle racing event in the Rangeley, Maine area Saturday June 29<sup>th</sup> and Sunday June 30<sup>th</sup>. The race (two-day, 40 miles) is the Rangeley Oquossoc Adventure Rendezvous (ROAR) and is is part of Maine's High Peaks PaddleFest. Detailed in information for these races and all 2024 Maine paddle races can be found on the MaCKRO web site. I am excited to see new races being offered in every corner of our state and hope that many of you will be able to get out there and support them!

Finally, we encourage folks to renew their MaCKRO memberships or become new MaCKRO members. The cost is minimal, actually a free-will donation with the amount up to you. We would like to see all folks who participate in the MaCKRO Downriver and Flatwater series to be MaCKRO members. The membership list is also a handy way for us to inform the entire MaCKRO community about any paddle race or other paddle events occurring in Maine.

## **General Clinton Canoe Regatta**

Maine was well represented in the 2023 General Clinton Canoe Regatta. Team "Big Al" returned this year in the Saturday Mixed Stock Aluminum Relay with respectable top 15 finish. Six boats from Maine participated in the Sunday 70 mile endurance in various classes that included two person canoe, one person canoe and one person kayak. The top three podium finishes were made by several boats.

#### The Chattajack 31 on the Tennessee River

Four Maine paddlers returned to The Chattajack 31 mile point to point paddle race in the Tennessee River Gorge in Chattanooga, Tennessee. It was a summer-like day in late October with a sunny sky and temperatures reaching into the 80s. Maine paddlers had another good showing in the race.

Paula Lunt was 147<sup>th</sup> overall out of 483 finishers with a time of 5:17:20 and 1<sup>st</sup> in the women's kayak class!! Dan Baumert was 192<sup>nd</sup> overall with a time of 5:34:16 and 20<sup>th</sup> out 42 in the men's kayak class. Hanna Rubin and Chip Loring were having a great race before they ran into heat issues and had to pull out after 20 miles. But they both vow that they will be back better than ever.

## **Thursday Evening Orono Paddlers race events**

The Thursday evening paddle events were again successful in 2023 at drawing members of the community to paddle on the Stillwater. Attendance varies quite a lot, with some Thursdays showing only the dedicated flatwater racers in attendance and others where those racers are joined by anywhere from 10 to 40 people in the big boats. We remain very reliant on the generosity of the Penobscot River Keepers (Mike Maybury, in particular) for the use of their big boats, and on MaCKRO members who continue to volunteer to captain those boats (Peggy McKee, Terry Wescott, Chip Loring, Bucky Owen, and Eric Gallandt, among others). And we thank RW Estella for setting and collecting the turn buoys every week. The Orono Paddlers have every expectation that this program will continue in 2024on July and August Thursday evenings. ## Youth Outreach

Orono Paddlers again hosted a youth paddling camp this August using the MaCKRO youth boats. It was a fun camp, though with just six kids. We hope to continue with camps each year and market them more to rebuild the participation back to closer to 12-15 each session.

Orono High School is hopeful that a new coach can be found to restart its Canoe Team this coming spring. They are still searching for an Assistant Coach who either has or is willing to become ETL certified (or a Registered Maine Guide) as this certification is now required for school paddle coaches.

After many years of service Jeff Owen is stepping down form the MaCKRO Youth Outreach position. He has and always been a faithful supporter of MaCKRO and especially youth paddle development. A big thanks to Jeff for all of the dedicated hard work he has done over the years for youth paddling. With that said we do have a current vacancy for the MaCKRO Youth Outreach position. If anyone is interested in helping out more with youth outreach let us know.

### **Tuesday Evening Group Training Paddles**

For the past few years there has been a group paddle around Orson Island Tuesday evenings in June, July and August. This is typically a good opportunity to do some friendly group flatwater race training. This is a good opportunity to work on paddling form and get tips and pointers from experienced racers. It is anticipated this will continue in 2024. All types of boats and paddlers are welcome and encouraged to come. #### Penobscot River Paddling Trail 2024 News



With the addition of 3 new locations, the Penobscot River Paddling Trail (PRPT) is closing in on its goal of a riverside campsite every 10 miles from Medway to Bucksport. The three new sites are all located downstream of the original Penobscot Salmon Club site, established in 2018. These additions bring the total number of campsites to 11 while also completing the southern tidal reach of the paddling trail.

The first of these new locations is Sturgeon Leap, located in Orrington just upstream from where the Ebb Tide Race finishes. The second new campsite, in Prospect, is Ferry Crossing *(etalikwsakahlaweletimek, "Place where one crosses")*. It is located near the site of a former ferry crossing between Prospect and Bucksport. The five-acre parcel was donated to the nonprofit volunteer organization, making it the first campsite to be owned by PRPT. All other sites are owned by individuals, a municipality (2) or a business (1).

The third new campsite will be located on the east shore of Verona Island. This site will mark the southernmost terminus of the Trail, with additional offshore sites offered by the Maine Island Trail Association (MITA). This site will be hosted by Great Pond Mountain Conservation Trust, which now owns and provides stewardship for the Joost Family Preserve. The Preserve includes shore frontage along the eastern channel, about 0.6 miles downstream of Porcupine Island. The Preserve includes existing parking and walking trails and, soon, a secluded campsite for river travelers. They will be adding a landing with steps to provide easier access from the tidal flat.

The 11 rustic PRPT campsites on the main stem of the Penobscot River, in order, are: Tannery Row-Winn, Medunkeunk Landing – Lincoln, Mohawk – North Howland, Nibezun-Passadumkeag, Riverbilly's Retreat – Argyle, Ketawamkihtek – Old Town, Oak Glen (Penobscot Valley Country Club) – Orono, Penobscot Salmon Club – Brewer. And now Sturgeon Leap, Ferry Crossing and Verona Island. The City of Old Town, citing code stipulations, has closed our campsite located at the southern end of French Island.

In 2023, PRPT elected Clayton Cole as its president.

For 2024, the organization plans to continue to scout for suitable locations in Medway.

PRPT is a 501c3 non-profit corporation. We have been fortunate to receive funding through grants and generous donations from individuals and organizations. Use of the trail is free. Our officers are Clayton Cole—President, Rick Henion—Vice President, Cloe Chunn—Secretary, Jim Neville-Treasurer. We currently have seven Board members: Peter Crockett, Linda Basilicato, Tom Mullin, Nick Bear, Greg Sarnacki, David Thanhauser. We are looking to add a few board members. Greg Dorr has been immensely helpful in helping us navigate setting up our corporation and addressing various legal questions. I invite you to visit our <u>Website</u>. #### Additional Information:

All sites are first come, first served with a privy or outhouse, tent sites, and a large picnic table located within 250 ft of the river. These are carry-in/carry-out, leave-no-trace campsites, lightly used and usually unoccupied. PRPT does hope to see use and traffic increase this year as word gets out. The trail was featured in the October 2022 issue of Maine Magazine (<u>MaineMag-Go with the Flow</u>) and has an ever increasing following on Facebook.

The unique thing about the trail is the incredibly easy access. Although the campsites are not accessible by road, there are many access points to the river all within an easy day's paddle of nearby campsites. You can leave a shuttle vehicle in Old Town or Brewer/Bangor and be in Medway within 90 minutes, ready to launch on your adventure. Some may choose to start upstream in the East Branch of the Penobscot. There are many trips that can be planned from one day to a week or more. There is excellent fishing for bass and other species along this stretch. Bald eagles are common along with many species of birds and waterfowl. Except for the intermittent class II-III rapids (well known to MaCKRO paddlers) from Old Town to Brewer, there are no significant rapids and only three portages at dams in Medway, Howland, and Old Town. The river in this section has a steady 3-5 mph current, low water conditions offer very good paddling in a semi-wilderness corridor.
